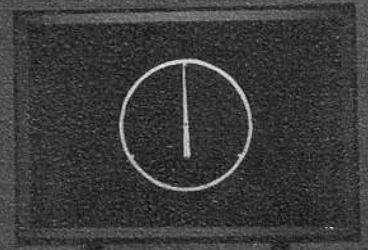
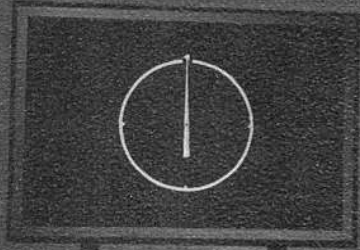


Lake Zurich Conducts Wednesday Night Enrichment Courses

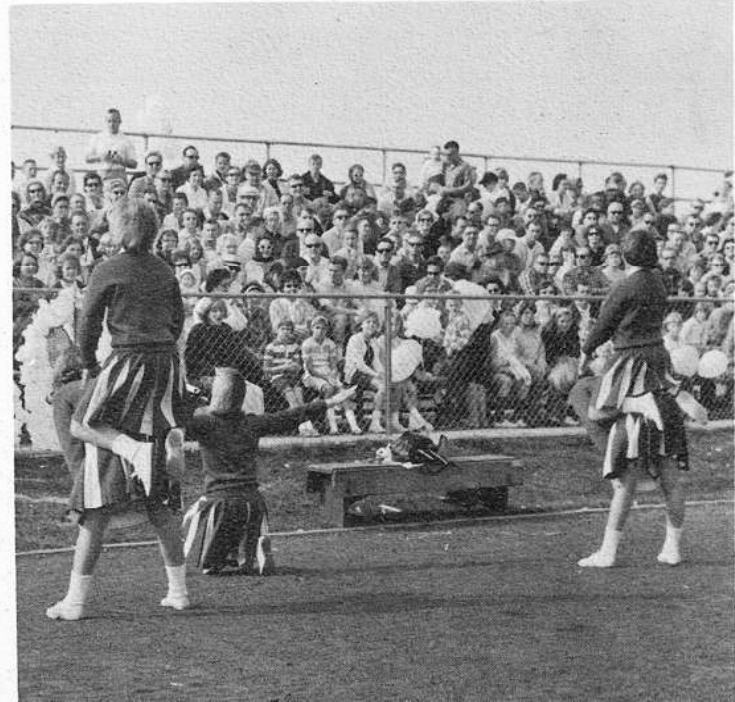
Lake Zurich high was filled with eagerness as homecoming began. Activities were initiated with the construction of floats and a fire and pep session on Thursday and Friday.

Other courses include: General Business, Bookkeeping, Office Practice, Shorthand, Business Law and Consumer Economics. 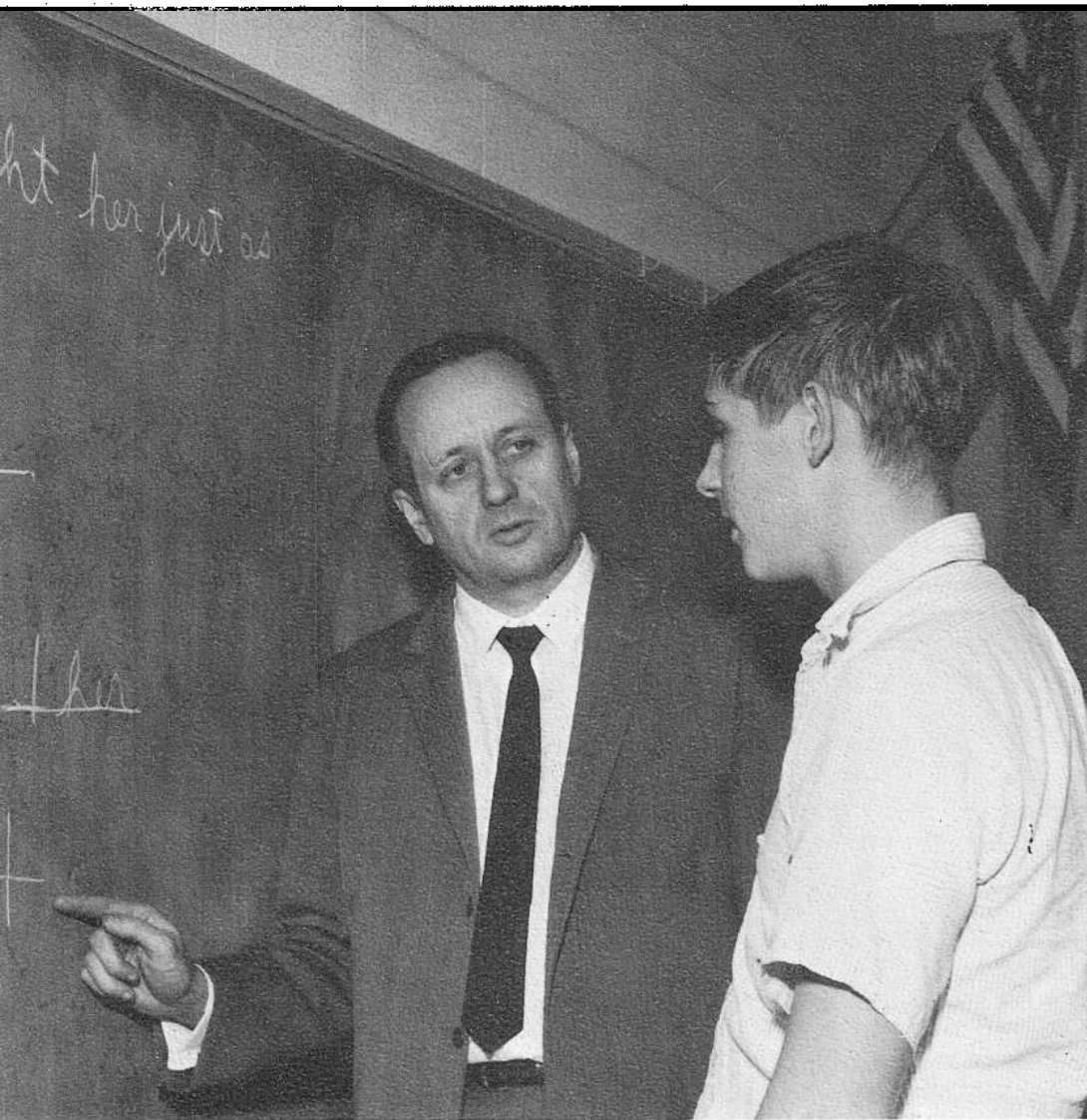

Accompanying these works were numerous film-strips and movies, obtained by the department to create more interest and a better understanding of the classics.

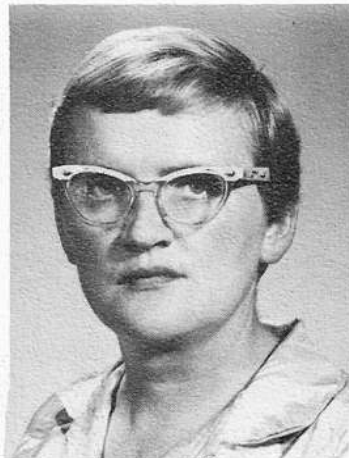
For those interested in deepening their knowledge of literature, a course in Humanities was offered. Along with the great works, a study of ones self was interjected.

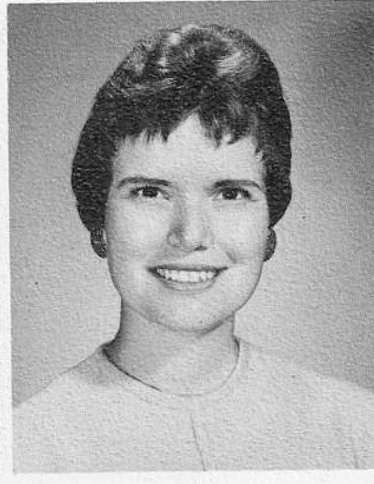

Four years of Home Economics were

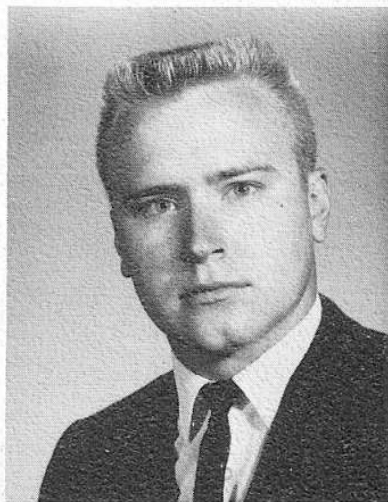
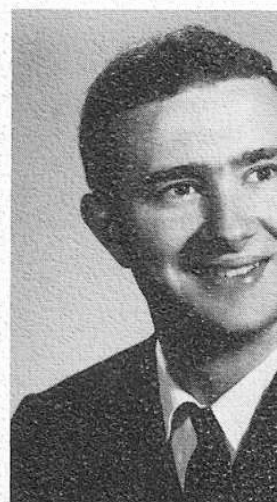
offered, and for the senior who had no previous experience in Home Economics, Home Economics Survey was offered. This class was a summarization of all basic learnings of the other years.

The aim of the department was better preparation today for the future homemaker of America.

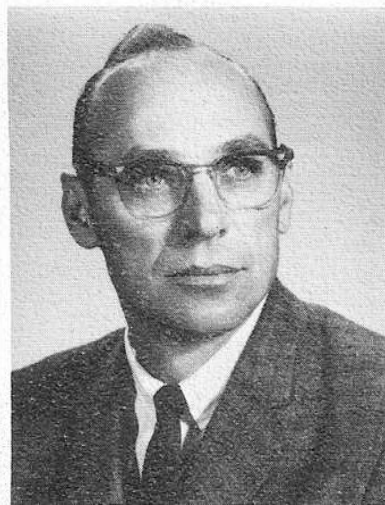

Two New Teachers Join Our Ranks

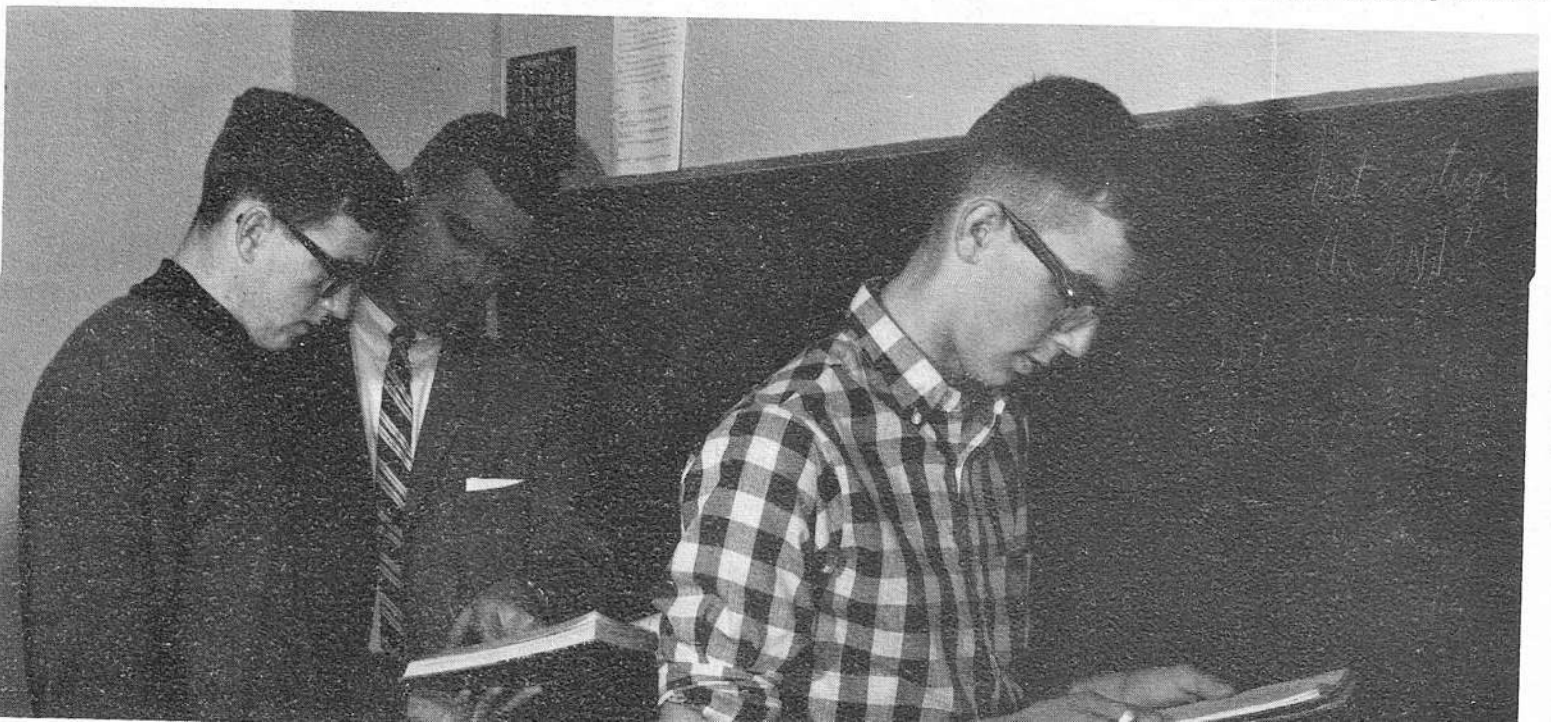

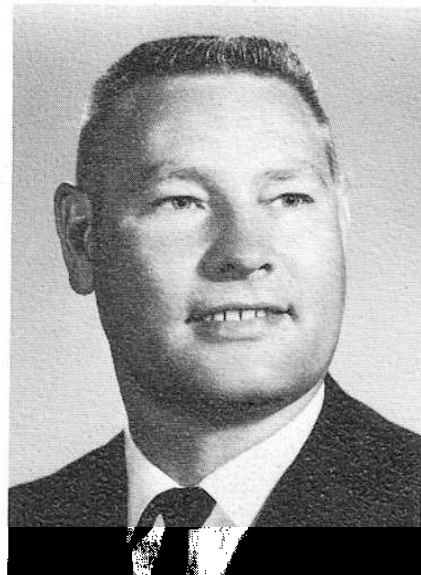

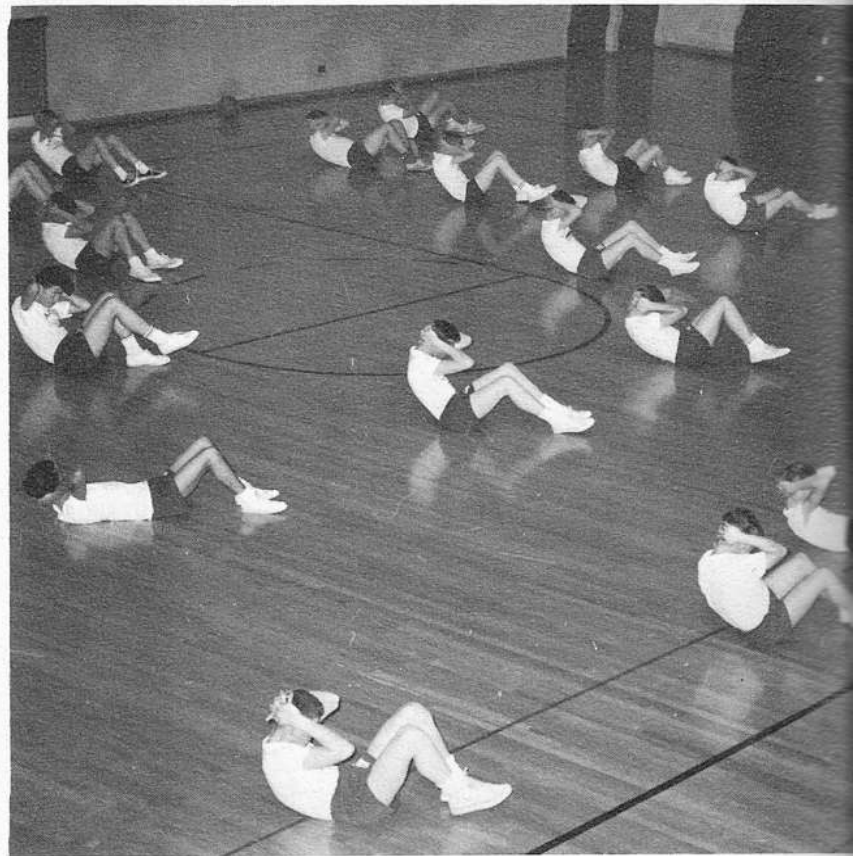
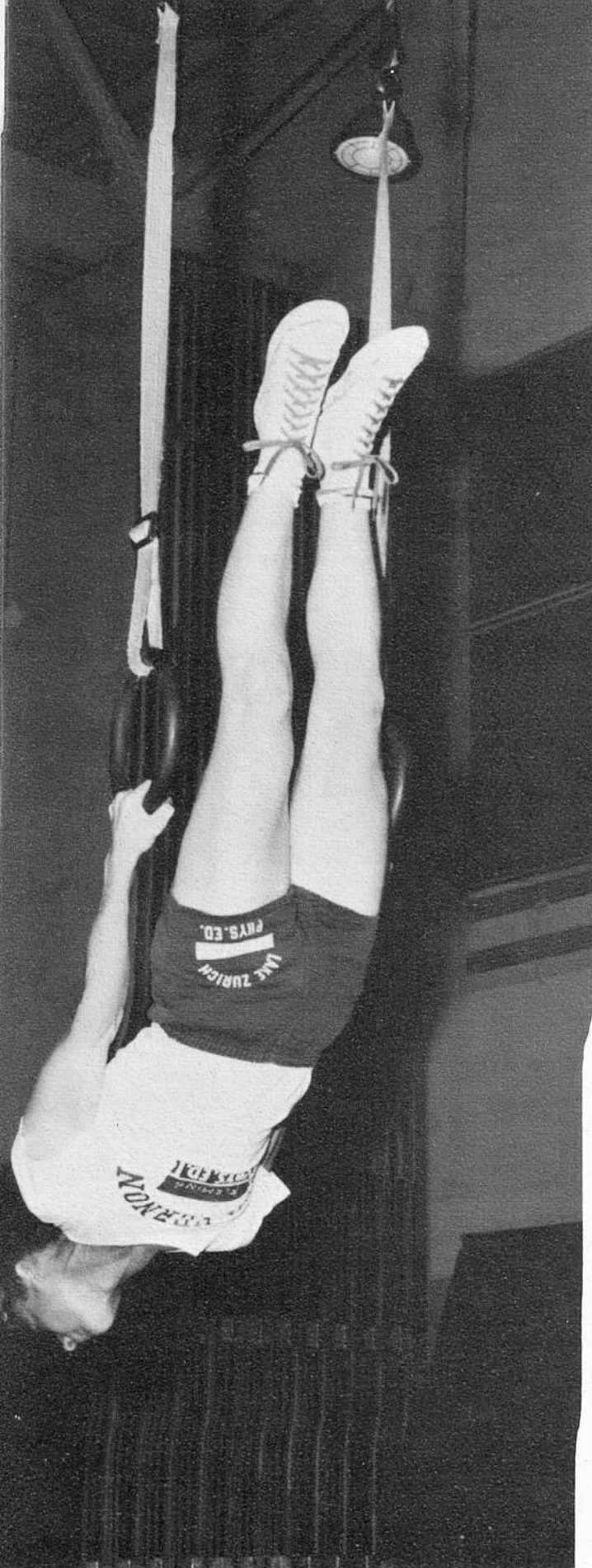
Industrial Skills are Acquired in the Many "Shop" Classes.

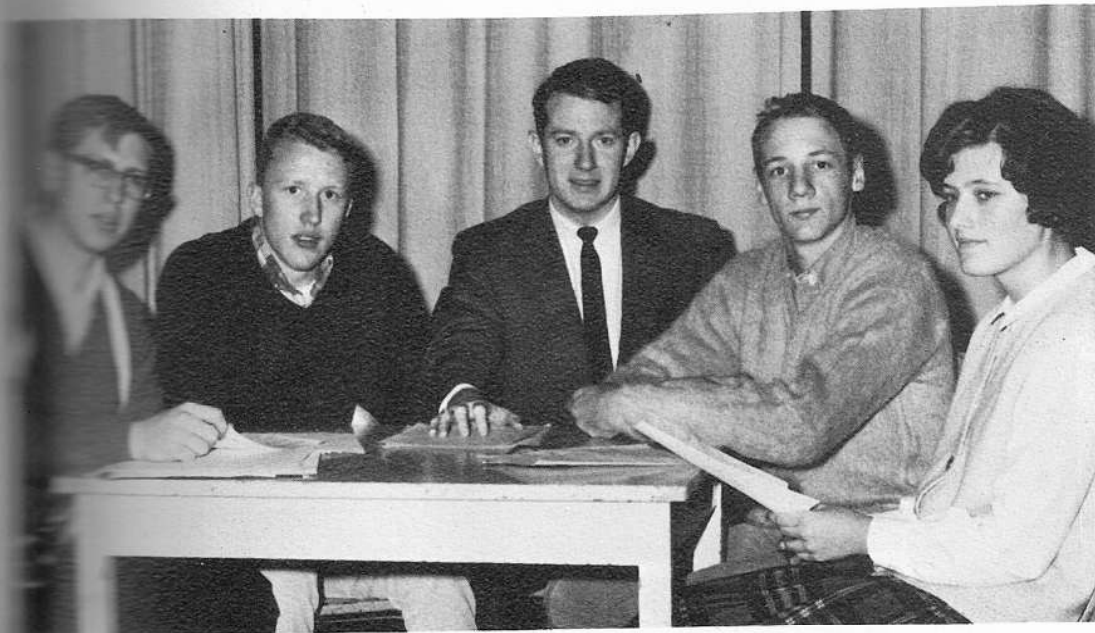

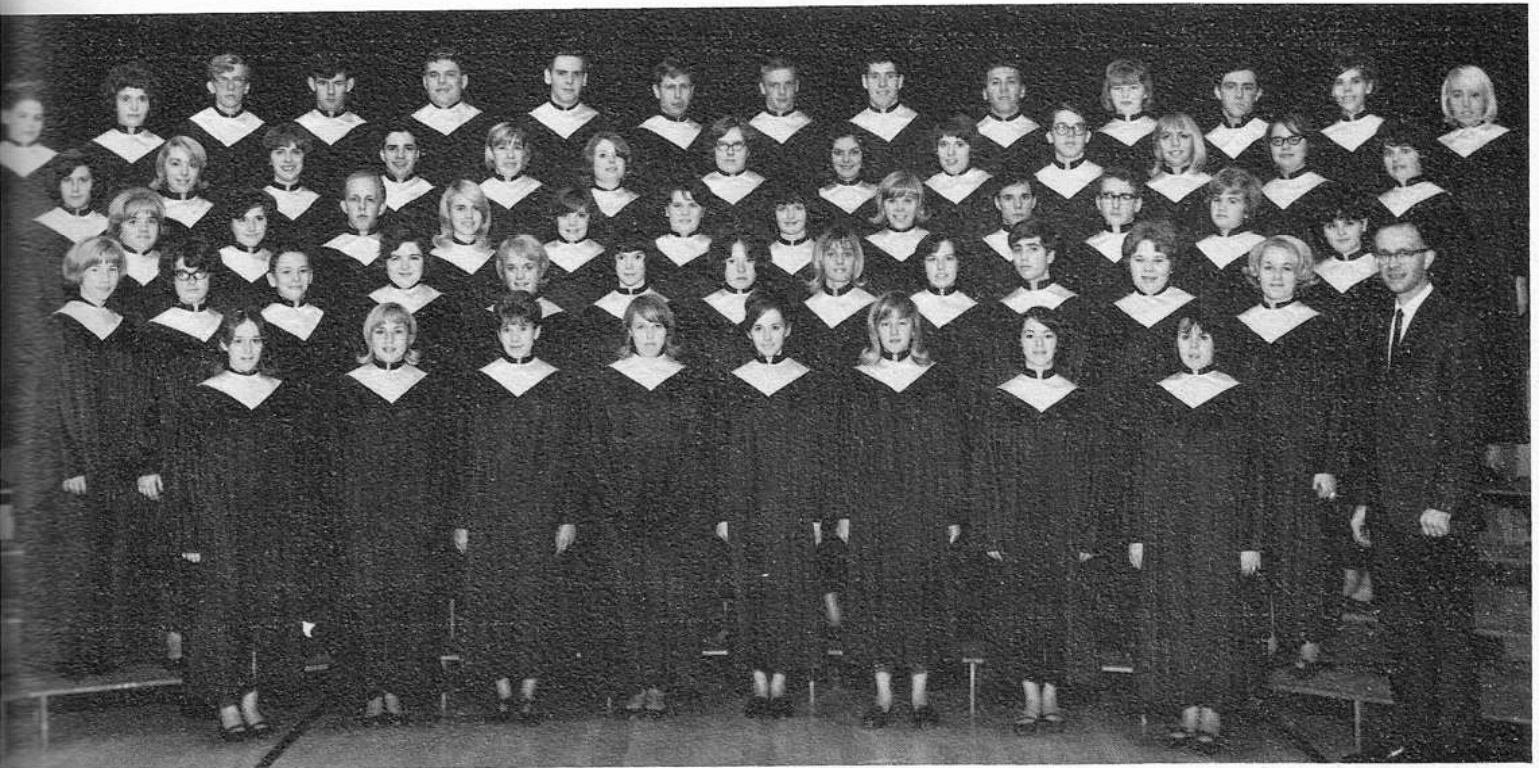

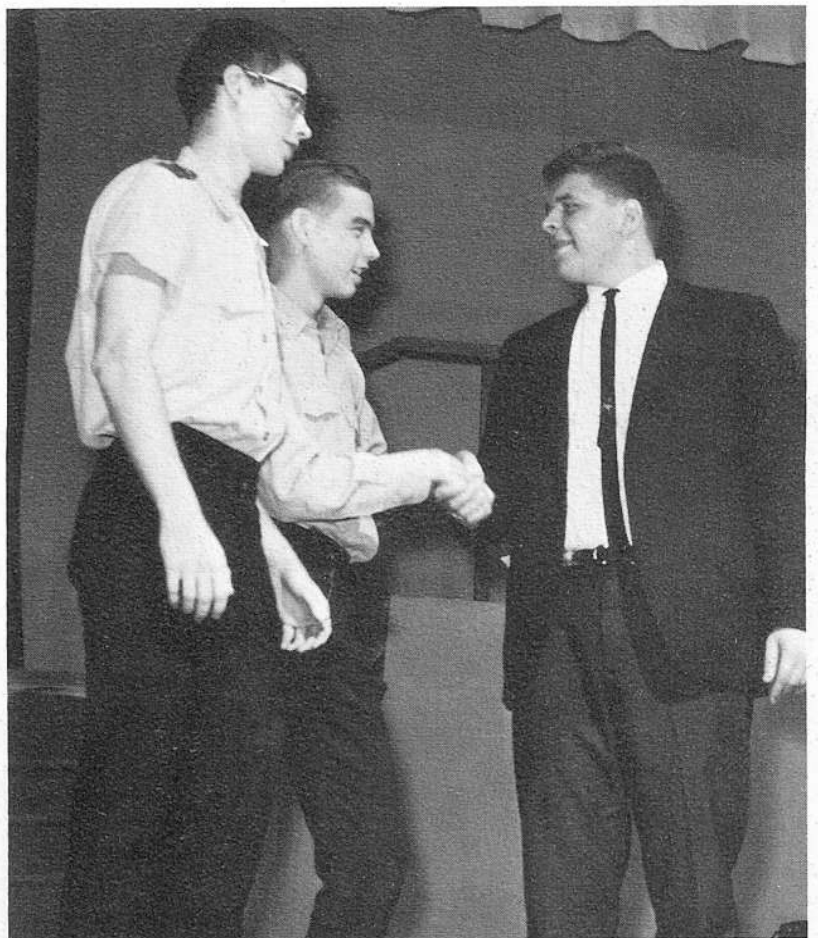

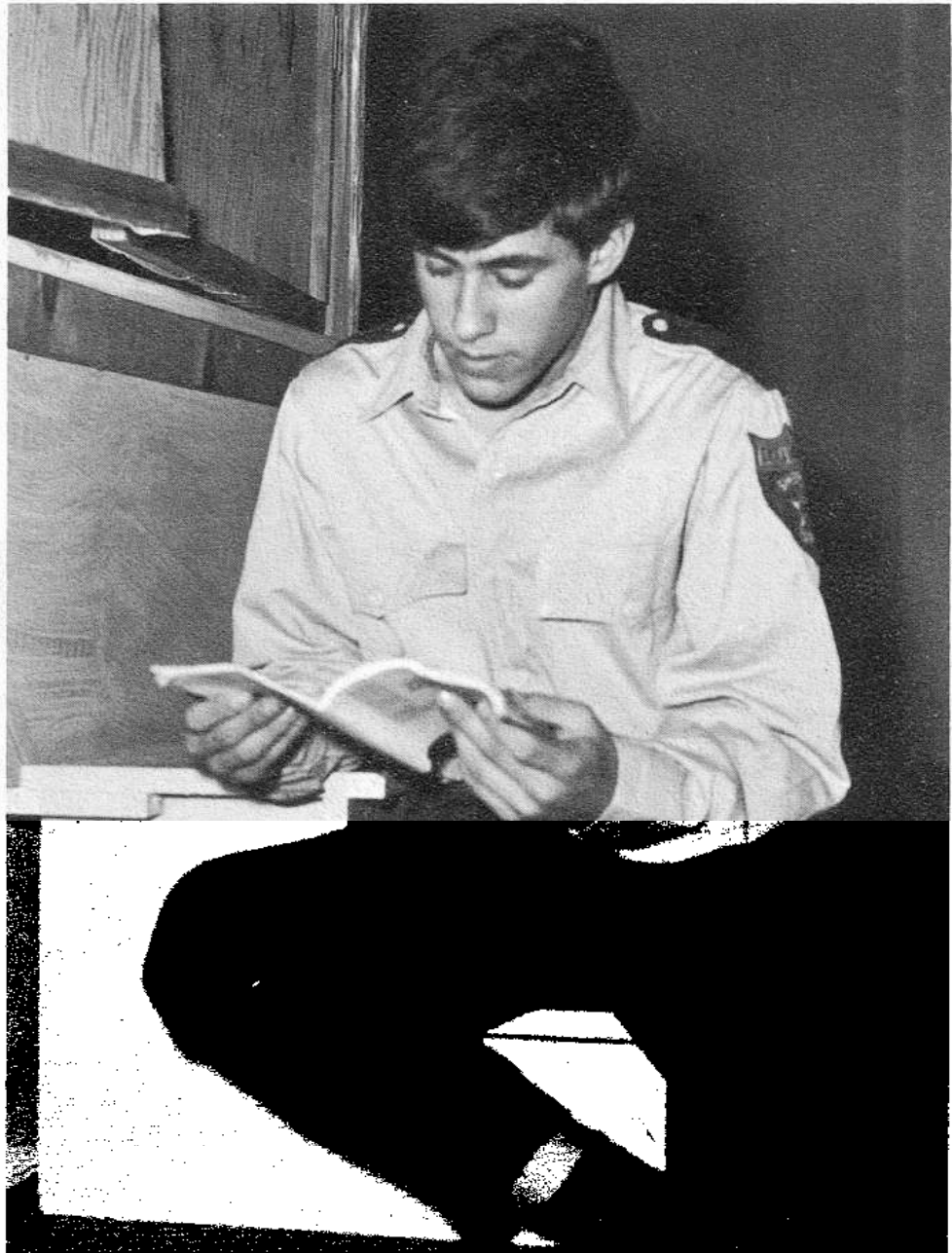

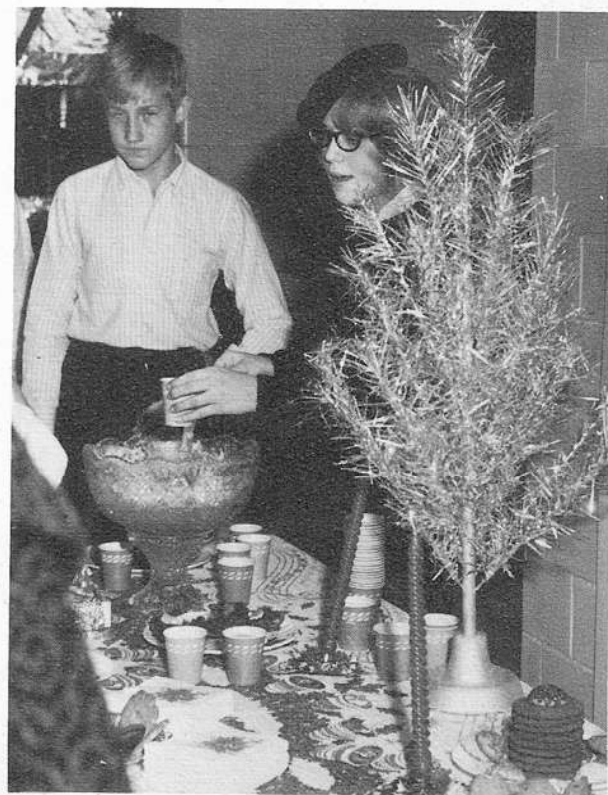

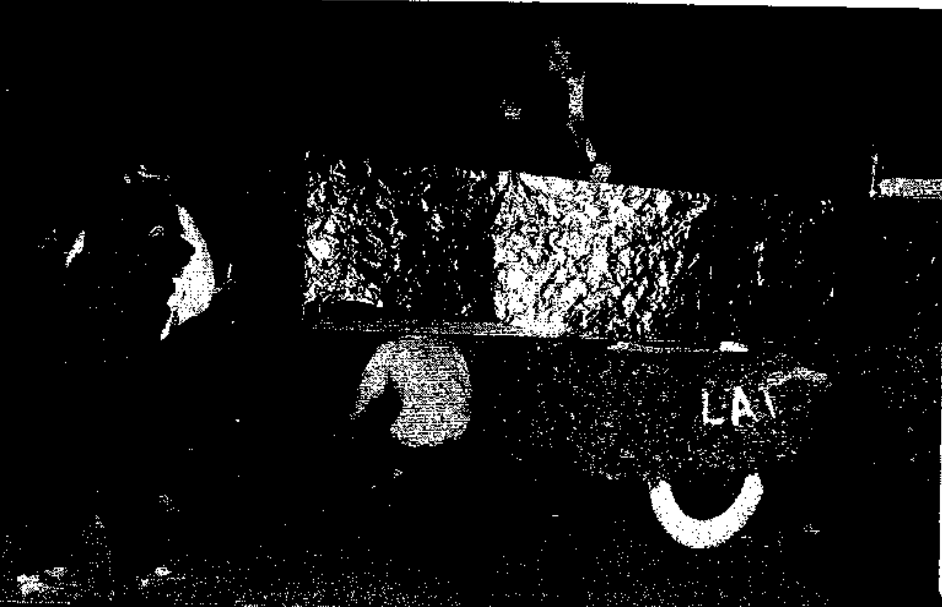

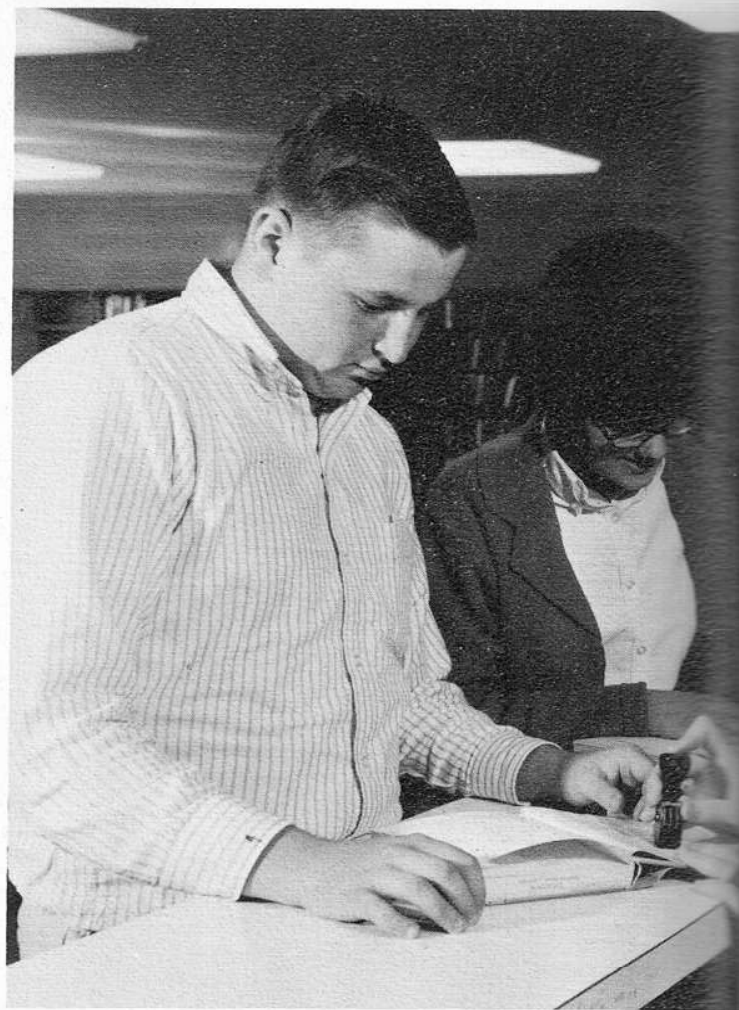

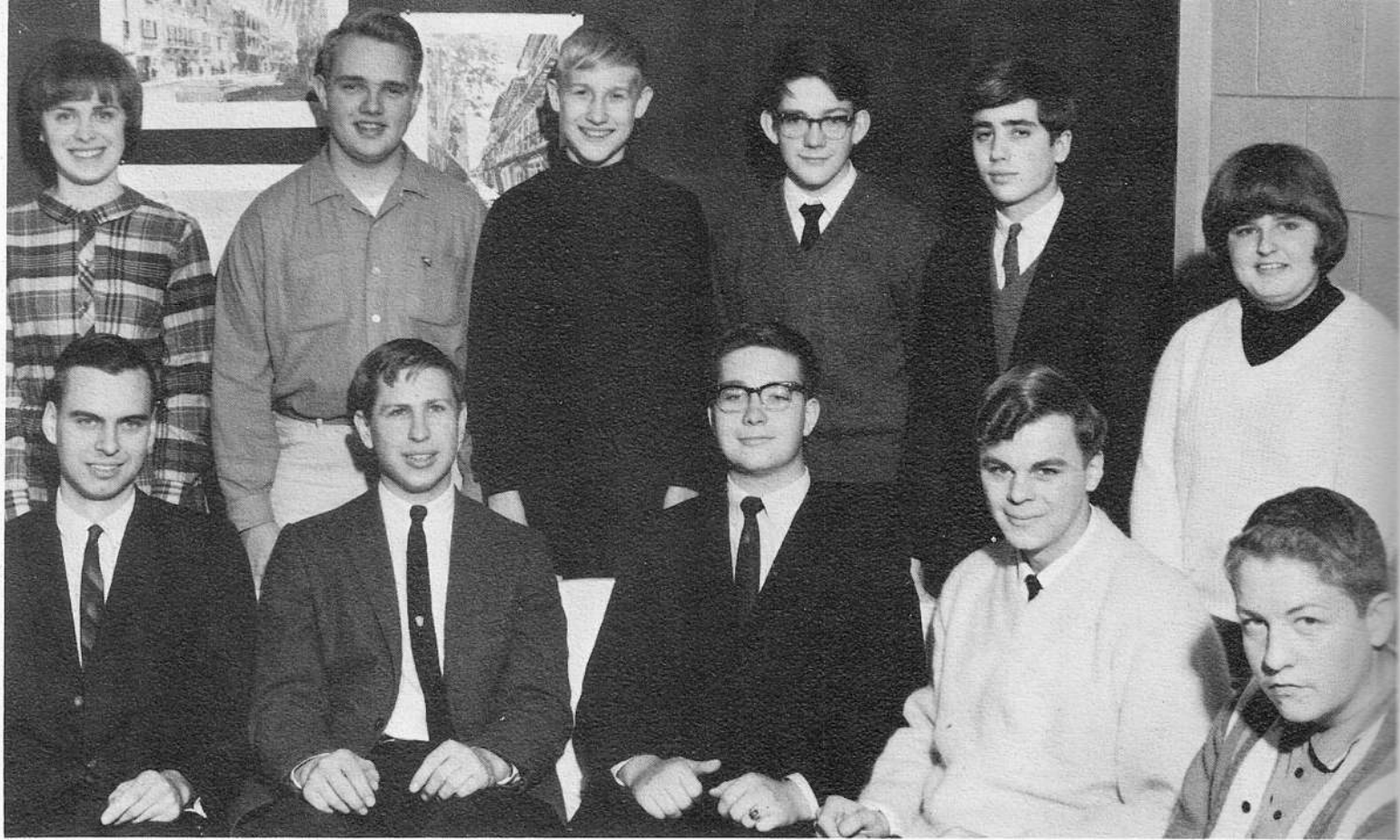

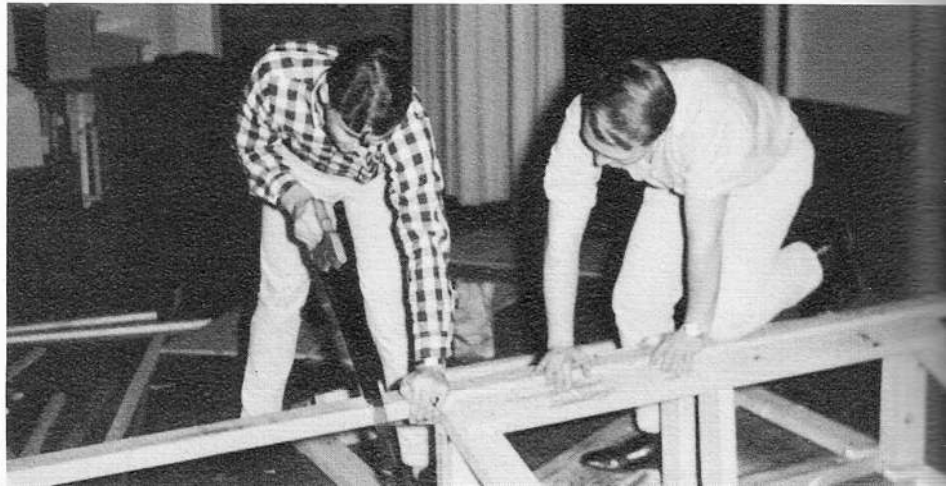

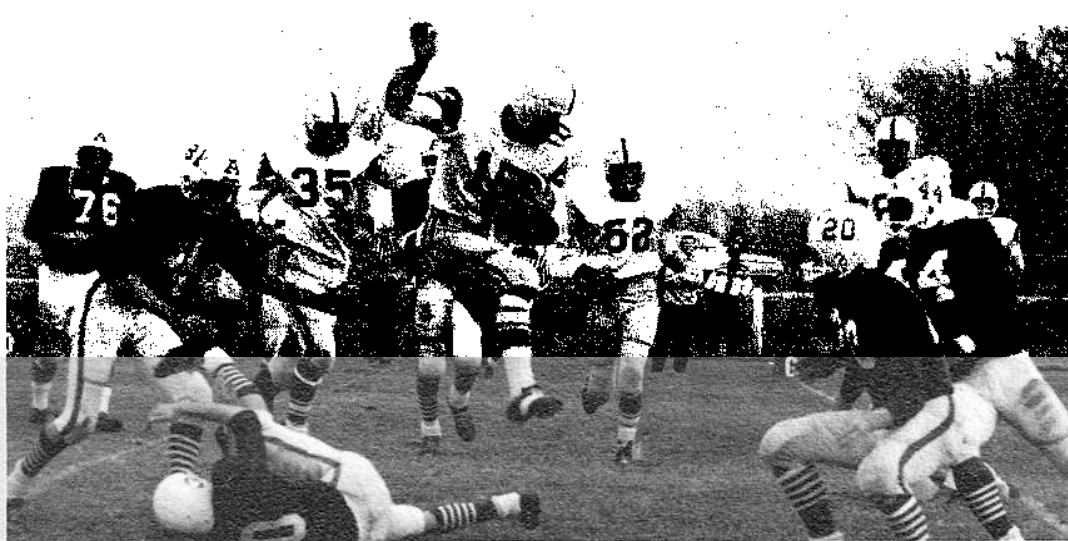

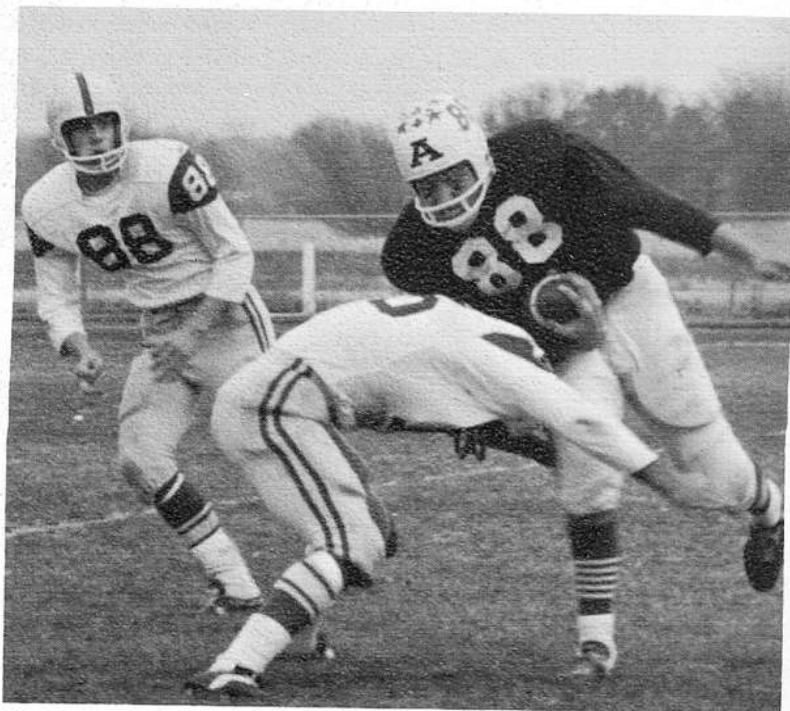
Excellent Coaching Raises Bears' Spirits

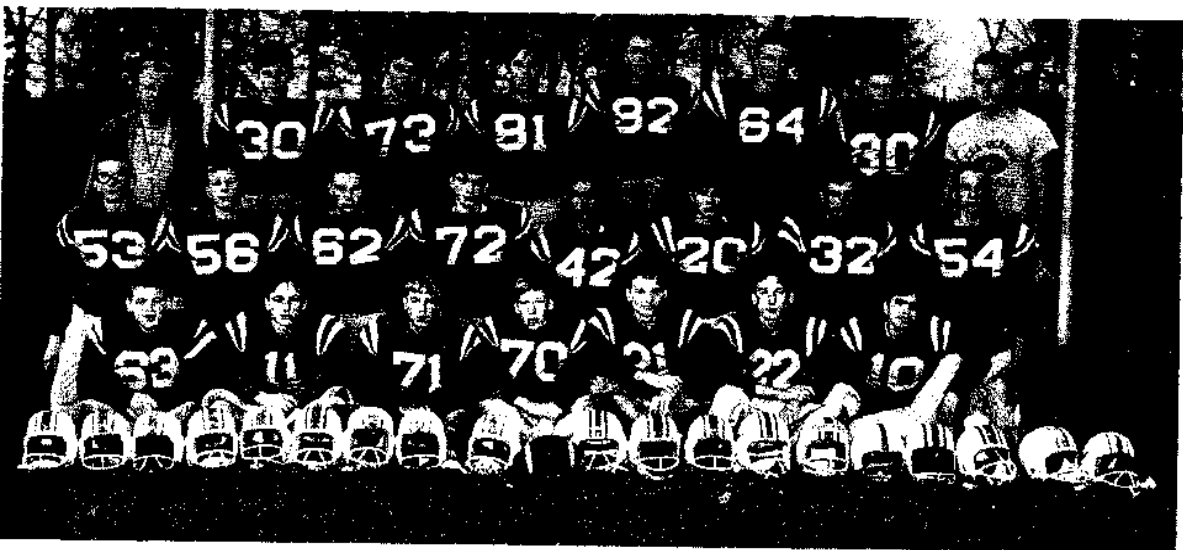

School events in 1965-66 were hampered, in general, due to action which took place early in July of 1965. The voters of Lake Zurich decided to form a school system known as a Unit District. The creation of a new district would ultimately reduce school taxes and eventually raise school standards. This action led to the bisection of the Ela-Vernon High School population; for a new building in Prairie View had just been built to educate Freshmen and Sophomores of the Long Grove-Lincolnshire area, but since that area was severed from our school district, Ela Vernon East became Adlai E. Stevenson Senior High School.

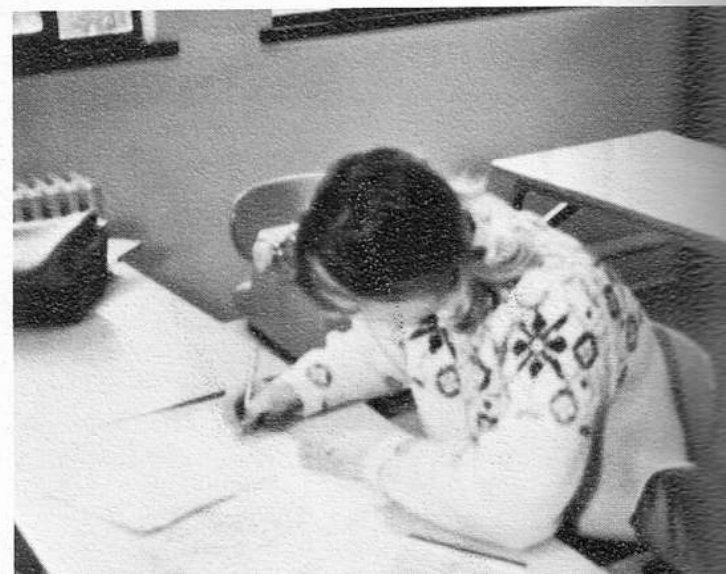
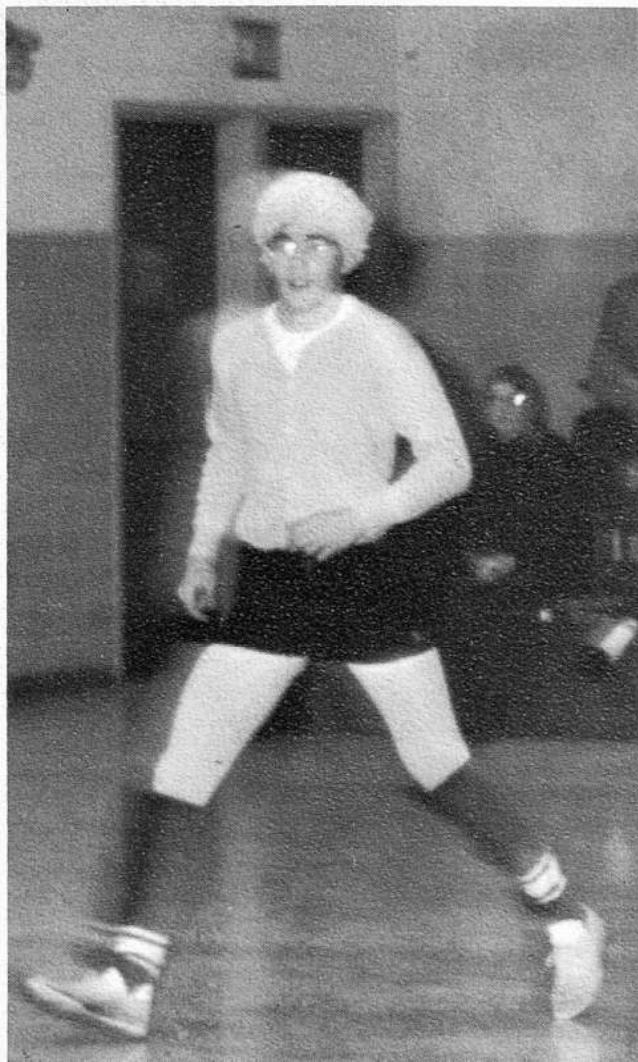
Because our school housed only 542 students, a general feeling of comfort was expressed by all. The lack of students did, however, hamper many events scheduled by various clubs and organizations.
